

Butterflies are a type of insect that can be found on every continent except for Antarctica. They taste with their feet and have a straw-like tube for a mouth.

Chipmunks build burrows underground, with many tunnels and rooms. They stay very close to their homes usually only traveling 160 feet from their burrows. They usually live alone, only living in a group when they are first born.

Echinacea is a perennial plant, which means that it comes back year after year. It is native to North America and is part of the daisy family. Echinacea has a prickly lower stem and gets its name from the Latin word *echinus*, which means hedgehog.

Lungwort is a plant that is native to Europe. It is a perennial plant, meaning that it returns every year, that prefers shady moist locations. Lungwort used to be used to treat lung illnesses, which is where the plant got its name. It flowers in the spring.

Sassafras trees are a type of deciduous tree native to America. Sassafras trees produce fruits and seeds that can be eaten by wildlife, but have also been used by people for a number of things. Native Americans have used the tree for medicinal purposes. Today, sassafras is used frequently to make root beer.

Sundials have been used by people for thousands of years to tell the time of day. A stick or vertical piece, called a gnomon, casts a shadow from the sun onto markings on a flat base. The Macculloch Hall sundial dates to 1876.
